Herbert Schnädelbach, in an essay published in 1981, *Über Irrationalität und Irrationalismus* (On Irrationality and Irrationalism), used the mirror as a metaphor for rationality and irrationality: irrationalism would be the way in which irrationality reflects itself in rationality and irrationalism is also a result of such a reflection.

We present this collection of multifaceted and deliberately heterogeneous contributions concerned **irrationalism** and its opponent, i.e. **anti-irrationalism**. Perhaps both history and prospects of contemporary methodological reflection could be described as a more or less subtle game played by exactly these two opponents. At the same time, the collection consists of studies in clarity (in the Whiteheadian sense of the word **rationalism**).

Kazimierz Ajdukiewicz (1890–1963), a Polish logician and philosopher, has been chosen to be the patron of our project since he defended an anti-irrationalistic view of science and philosophy. Let us take this opportunity to emphasize that exactly fifty years ago the English translation of the book *Die zeitgenössischen Denkmethoden* by J.M. Bocheński was published, and the Spanish version appeared a little earlier. Bocheński was a strong adherent of the use of logical techniques even in religious matters and theology.
